AN ACT

1 Designating the bridge, identified as Bridge Key 5059, carrying
 2 State Route 2021 over Mineral Springs Creek in the City of
 3 Reading, Berks County, as the PFC Lawrence J. Deisher
 4 Memorial Bridge; designating the bridge, identified as Bridge
 5 Key 6917, carrying State Route 4202 over Pennsylvania Route
 6 611 in Doylestown Township, Bucks County, as the Donald E.
 7 Parlee Memorial Bridge; designating the portion of State
 8 Route 2017, also known as Lisburn Road, from Segment
 9 90/Offset 300 to Segment 90/Offset 2200 in Lower Allen
 10 Township, Cumberland County, as the Sgt. Josue "Rocky" Saez,
 11 Jr., Memorial Road; designating the portion of State Route
 12 1016, also known as Holme Avenue, from the intersection with
 13 Winchester Avenue to the intersection with Holme Circle, in
 14 the City of Philadelphia, Philadelphia County, as the
 15 Sergeant Timothy Simpson Memorial Road; designating a bridge,
 16 identified as Bridge Key 8345, on that portion of U.S. Route
 17 22 over Howells Run in Cambria Township, Cambria County, as
 18 the Michael G. Tsikalas Memorial Bridge; designating a
 19 bridge, identified as Bridge Key 8344, carrying U.S. Route 22
 20 over Pennsylvania Route 160, also known as New Germany Road,
 21 in Cambria Township, Cambria County, as the Charles J.
 22 Vizzini Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge, identified as
 23 Bridge Key 3795, carrying Pennsylvania Route 251 over
 24 Interstate 376 in Chippewa Township, Beaver County, as the
 25 Private Mahlon R. Evans Memorial Bridge; designating a
 26 bridge, identified as Bridge Key 57032, carrying Pennsylvania
 27 Route 351 over the Beaver River between Koppel Borough and
 28 North Sewickley Township, Beaver County, as the Sgt. Skip
 29 Haswell Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge carrying the
 30 Pennsylvania Turnpike Mainline Eastbound over the Beaver
 31 River at mile marker 13.2 in Beaver County as the Colonel
 32 Joseph H. Thompson Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge
 33 carrying the Pennsylvania Turnpike Mainline Westbound over
 34 the Beaver River at mile marker 13.2 in Beaver County as the
 35 Colonel Matthew S. Quay Memorial Bridge; designating a

1 bridge, identified as Bridge Key 68136, carrying State Route
2 4028 over Mill Creek in Hamburg Borough, Berks County, as the
3 Sergeant Jackie Seltzer Memorial Bridge; designating a
4 bridge, identified as Bridge Key 7027, in Middletown
5 Township, Bucks County, as the Lance Corporal John F. Muffler
6 Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge, identified as Bridge
7 Key 52786, carrying Pennsylvania Route 213 over the Neshaminy
8 Creek in Lower Southampton Township, Bucks County, as the
9 Ensign Sarah Mitchell Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge,
10 identified as Bridge Key 47666, carrying U.S. Route 219 over
11 the West Branch Susquehanna River in Susquehanna Township,
12 Cambria County, as the Staff Sergeant Peter P. Abromovich
13 Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge, identified as Bridge
14 Key 48914, carrying Gallitzin Road, State Route 53, over
15 Norfolk Southern Railroad, located in Gallitzin Township,
16 Cambria County, as the Corporal James R. Beck USMC Memorial
17 Bridge; designating a bridge, identified as Bridge Key 52761,
18 carrying Pennsylvania Route 53 over Clearfield Creek in
19 Gallitzin Township, Cambria County, as the Private Philip A.
20 Watt Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge, identified as
21 Bridge Key 8645, carrying Galleria Drive (State Route 3031)
22 over U.S. Route 219 in Richland Township, Cambria County, as
23 the PFC Paul O. Malzi and PFC Harry R. Malzi Memorial Bridge;
24 designating a bridge, identified as Bridge Key 9755, carrying
25 State Route 3027 over the Moshannon Creek in Rush Township,
26 Centre County, as the Osceola Mills World War II Memorial
27 Bridge; designating a bridge, identified as Bridge Key 42031,
28 located on that portion of U.S. Route 219 over Pentz Run on
29 the border of Sandy Township and the City of DuBois,
30 Clearfield County, as the Trooper First Class Brad Wilson
31 Honorary Bridge; designating a bridge, identified as Bridge
32 Key 11380, carrying U.S. Route 219 over the West Branch
33 Susquehanna River in Burnside Borough, Clearfield County, as
34 the Sarah "Marie" Blose Rorabaugh Memorial Bridge;
35 designating a bridge, identified as Bridge Key 11226,
36 carrying Pennsylvania Route 53 over the Clearfield Creek in
37 Bigler Township, Clearfield County, as the Sergeant John
38 Harold Branic Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge,
39 identified as Bridge Key 13685, carrying Army Heritage Drive
40 over Interstate 81 in Middlesex Township, Cumberland County,
41 as the Major General Harold "Harry" Greene Memorial Bridge;
42 designating a bridge, identified as Bridge Key 56021,
43 carrying Pennsylvania Route 997 over Conodoguinet Creek in
44 Letterkenny Township, Franklin County, as the Pvt. Clyde C.
45 McVitty Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge, identified as
46 Bridge Key 18248, carrying State Route 2003 over Dunkard
47 Creek in Mt. Morris, Perry Township, Greene County, as the H.
48 Ronald Hoskinson Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge,
49 identified as Bridge Key 52783, carrying Pennsylvania Route
50 913 over Shoup Run in Coalmont Borough, Huntingdon County, as
51 the Private Samuel H. Thompson Memorial Bridge; designating a
52 bridge, identified as Bridge Key 68411, carrying Jacksonville
53 Road (State Route 3016) over Two Lick Creek in Homer City,
54 Indiana County, as the Staff Sergeant William Stivison
55 Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge, identified as Bridge
56 Key 52686, carrying Pennsylvania Route 441 over U.S. Route 30
57 in Columbia Borough, Lancaster County, as the Major General
58 Edward C. Shannon Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge,
59 identified as Bridge Key 67935, carrying State Route 1015
60 over the Raystown Branch of the Juniata River in Allegheny

1 Township, Somerset County, as the Staff Sergeant William Will
2 Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge, identified as Bridge
3 Key 31544, carrying State Route 1016 over the Dark Shade
4 Creek in Shade Township, Somerset County, as the Seaman First
5 Class Raymond Kozik Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge,
6 identified as Bridge Key 31426, carrying East Campus Avenue
7 over U.S. Route 219 in Conemaugh Township, Somerset County,
8 as the Kenneth J. Newcomer Memorial Bridge; designating a
9 bridge, identified as Bridge Key 31696, carrying State Route
10 3011 over the Casselman River in Black Township, Somerset
11 County, as the S2 Earl J. Peters Memorial Bridge; designating
12 a bridge, identified as Bridge Key 36247, carrying
13 Pennsylvania Route 711 over Loyalhanna Creek in Ligonier
14 Township, Westmoreland County, as the Staff Sergeant Alvin P.
15 Carey and Private John C. Ewing Medal of Honor Memorial
16 Bridge; designating a bridge, identified as Bridge Key 54167,
17 carrying U.S. Route 30 over Paradise Creek between Paradise
18 Township and Jackson Township, York County, as the Private
19 Edward J. Stambaugh Memorial Bridge; designating a portion of
20 U.S. Route 522 from the intersection with Main Street to the
21 intersection with Town Hill Street in Shade Gap Borough,
22 Huntingdon County, as the Special Agent Terry R. Anderson
23 Memorial Highway; designating a portion of State Route 2008
24 from the intersection with State Route 2009 to the
25 intersection with Pennsylvania Route 56 in West Wheatfield
26 Township and East Wheatfield Township, Indiana County, as the
27 Robindale Memorial Highway; designating the interchange of
28 Interstate 380 with Pennsylvania Route 940 in Tobyhanna
29 Township, Monroe County, as the William F. Quinn Memorial
30 Interchange; designating a bridge, identified as Bridge Key
31 8574, carrying State Route 1021 over Clearfield Creek in
32 White Township, Cambria County, as the Sergeant Charles Owen
33 Jenkins, Jr., Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge, carrying
34 the Pennsylvania Turnpike 576 Southern Beltway Eastbound and
35 Westbound over Pennsylvania Route 980 at mile marker S-12.35,
36 as the Terry D. Tackett Jr. Memorial Bridge; and making
37 repeals.

38 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
39 hereby enacts as follows:

40 Section 1. PFC Lawrence J. Deisher Memorial Bridge.

41 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
42 follows:

43 (1) Private First Class Lawrence J. Deisher was born
44 July 9, 1947, and was raised in Reading.

45 (2) PFC Deisher served in the United States Army during
46 the Vietnam War and was a distinguished member of the 2nd
47 Battalion, 502nd Infantry Brigade, 101st Airborne Division.

48 (3) On June 9, 1966, PFC Deisher made the ultimate

1 sacrifice when he fearlessly engaged with the enemy.

2 (4) On that day, PFC Deisher displayed unparalleled
3 bravery and tactical prowess, which resulted in the
4 neutralization of the imminent threat.

5 (5) PFC Deisher's actions on that day earned him the
6 Silver Star, a testament to his valor and selflessness.

7 (6) PFC Deisher not only met but surpassed the stringent
8 criteria required to join the esteemed 101st Airborne
9 Division, showcasing exceptional skill, unwavering commitment
10 and unparalleled courage.

11 (7) PFC Deisher's life, heroism and sacrifice exemplify
12 the highest standards of service and serve as a beacon of
13 inspiration for many.

14 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key 5059,
15 carrying State Route 2021 over Mineral Springs Creek in the City
16 of Reading, Berks County, is designated as the PFC Lawrence J.
17 Deisher Memorial Bridge.

18 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
19 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
20 traffic in both directions of the bridge.

21 Section 2. Donald E. Parlee Memorial Bridge.

22 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
23 follows:

24 (1) Donald E. Parlee, M.D., was born in Philadelphia and
25 attended Germantown High School.

26 (2) Dr. Parlee earned a B.S. degree from Ursinus College
27 in 1955 and graduated from Temple University School of
28 Medicine in 1959.

29 (3) Dr. Parlee enjoyed a 43-year career as a board-
30 certified radiologist at Doylestown Hospital and grew the

1 radiology department from one physician to 20 radiologists.

2 (4) Dr. Parlee served as chief of the radiology
3 department for 25 years and established the hospital's School
4 of Radiologic Technology.

5 (5) Dr. Parlee earned a Bronze Star for serving our
6 country for the United States Army in Vietnam from 1966 to
7 1968, including during the Tet Offensive. At one point, he
8 was the most senior radiologist in Vietnam and trained other
9 radiologists throughout the country.

10 (6) Dr. Parlee was involved in many philanthropic
11 endeavors, including those benefiting Doylestown Hospital,
12 Ursinus College, the Bucks County Audubon Society, the
13 Bowman's Hill Wildlife Preserve and the Peace Valley Nature
14 Center.

15 (7) Dr. Parlee proudly gave back to his profession,
16 serving as President of the Bucks County Medical Society, as
17 Vice Chair of the Foundation of the Pennsylvania Medical
18 Society and as delegate to the American Medical Association
19 for 10 years.

20 (8) Dr. Parlee also contributed to his alma mater,
21 Ursinus College, serving in various roles with the Ursinus
22 Board of Trustees beginning in 1983 and as President of the
23 Ursinus Alumni Association.

24 (9) Along with his wife, fellow Ursinus College
25 graduate, Joan Parlee, Dr. Parlee supported many initiatives
26 at Ursinus College, including scholarships, capital building
27 projects, summer student research, the Ursinus Fund and, most
28 notably, the endowment of the Parlee Center for Science and
29 the Common Good.

30 (10) In 2023, the Parlees were awarded with one of

1 Ursinus College's highest honors, the Bear2Bear Impact Award
2 for Leadership and Service, in recognition of the
3 extraordinary impact their work and philanthropic efforts
4 have had on their community.

5 (11) Dr. Parlee passed away on March 21, 2024, at 89
6 years of age, leaving behind a legacy of unwavering
7 commitment to the betterment of his community through
8 selfless service and philanthropy.

9 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key 6917
10 carrying State Route 4202 over Pennsylvania Route 611 in
11 Doylestown Township, Bucks County, is designated as the Donald
12 E. Parlee Memorial Bridge.

13 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
14 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
15 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

16 Section 3. Sergeant Josue "Rocky" Saez, Jr., Memorial Road.

17 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
18 follows:

19 (1) Sergeant Saez was a dedicated, caring and
20 irreplaceable officer within SCI Camp Hill having served the
21 Department of Corrections for over 15 years as both an
22 officer and sergeant, earning the position of first shift
23 Diagnostic and Classification Sergeant, through which he
24 consistently ensured that all operations were covered.

25 (2) Sergeant Saez earned the respect of both staff and
26 inmates alike, serving as a humble yet confident role model
27 to those around him and standing up for the good and
28 protecting the powerless in his work and his home.

29 (3) Sergeant Saez died senselessly and tragically on
30 November 4, 2023, while addressing a noise complaint with a

1 neighbor while off-duty.

2 (4) Sergeant Saez's loss will continue to be deeply felt
3 among his peers at SCI Camp Hill, his family and friends and
4 among those he supervised and served as an officer and he
5 will be remembered for his engaging personality, dedication,
6 sincere respect, consideration of others and smile.

7 (5) 2023 marks both the 15th anniversary of his service
8 to the Department of Corrections as well as the end of his
9 watch. Though nothing will fill the void of such a loss, the
10 renaming of this road will memorialize the service,
11 dedication, sacrifice and legacy of Sergeant Josue "Rocky"
12 Saez, Jr.

13 (b) Designation.--The portion of State Route 2017, also
14 known as Lisburn Road, from Segment 90/Offset 300 to Segment
15 90/Offset 2200 in Lower Allen Township, Cumberland County, is
16 designated as the Sgt. Josue "Rocky" Saez, Jr., Memorial Road.

17 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
18 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to
19 traffic in both directions on the highway.

20 Section 4. Sergeant Timothy Simpson Memorial Road.

21 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
22 follows:

23 (1) Timothy Simpson was appointed to the Philadelphia
24 Police Department on November 14, 1988.

25 (2) He was subsequently promoted to Corporal in 1998 and
26 became a Sergeant in 2005.

27 (3) Sergeant Simpson's most recent assignment was with
28 the 24th Police District as the Sergeant of Squad 2A.

29 (4) Prior to serving with the Philadelphia Police
30 Department, Sergeant Simpson served with the United States

1 Army and was a police officer for the Southeastern
2 Pennsylvania Transportation Authority (SEPTA).

3 (5) On November 17, 2008, Sergeant Simpson was killed in
4 the line of duty at the age of 46 while responding to a
5 robbery call when his patrol car was involved in a collision
6 with another vehicle operated by an intoxicated driver.

7 (6) Sergeant Simpson served with the Philadelphia Police
8 Department for 20 years.

9 (7) During his career, Sergeant Simpson received a
10 Heroism Commendation, four Merit Commendations, and one
11 Commendatory Letter.

12 (b) Designation.--The portion of State Route 1016, also
13 known as Holme Avenue, from the intersection with Winchester
14 Avenue to the intersection with Holme Circle, in the City of
15 Philadelphia, Philadelphia County, is designated as the Sergeant
16 Timothy Simpson Memorial Road.

17 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
18 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
19 traffic in both directions of the bridge.

20 Section 5. Michael G. Tsikalas Memorial Bridge.

21 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
22 follows:

23 (1) Michael G. Tsikalas was born June 3, 1926, in
24 Uniontown.

25 (2) Mr. Tsikalas enlisted in the United States Navy
26 during World War II and was assigned to an amphibious land
27 cruiser, which was one of the first ships to land on Omaha
28 Beach during D-Day.

29 (3) After the war, Mr. Tsikalas worked for more than 40
30 years at the Hi-Way Diner and acted as a guide for many young

1 men in need or searching for advice.

2 (4) Mr. Tsikalas served as a role model while coaching
3 grade school football for more than 30 years at both Holy
4 Name Elementary School and Ebensburg Elementary School.

5 (5) Mr. Tsikalas' devotion to his community included
6 more than 20 years of service as Mayor of Ebensburg Borough
7 and Cambria County Prothonotary.

8 (6) As Mayor, Mr. Tsikalas was instrumental in many
9 improvements, including the Rowena Revitalization Project and
10 the Ebensburg Main Street Program.

11 (7) Mr. Tsikalas took great joy in administering the
12 Naturalization Oath of Allegiance to the United States of
13 America to new American citizens in his position as Cambria
14 County Prothonotary.

15 (8) Mr. Tsikalas was best known as "Mayor Mike" and
16 "Coach" to countless members of his community.

17 (9) Mr. Tsikalas passed away on May 18, 2022, after
18 decades of selfless service to his community.

19 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key 8345,
20 on that portion of U.S. Route 22 over Howells Run in Cambria
21 Township, Cambria County, is designated the Michael G. Tsikalas
22 Memorial Bridge.

23 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
24 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
25 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

26 Section 6. Charles J. Vizzini Memorial Bridge.

27 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
28 follows:

29 (1) Charles J. Vizzini was born March 8, 1924, to John
30 and Lillian Vizzini in Colver.

1 (2) He served in the United States Army during World War
2 II as a private and was wounded twice.

3 (3) While fighting in France, Private Vizzini was struck
4 in the chest by bullets from a German automatic pistol and
5 was saved from serious injury and possible death by a
6 Catholic Bible in his left breast pocket and a Catholic
7 missal in his right breast pocket when bullets penetrated
8 both books.

9 (4) After returning to Cambria County, Mr. Vizzini went
10 on to graduate from Cambria Rowe Business College and later
11 worked for a time as a coal miner and steelworker, in the
12 Ebensburg Center and, eventually, at the Office of Auditor
13 General for more than 25 years.

14 (5) A passionate advocate for his fellow veterans, Mr.
15 Vizzini served as Commander of Ebensburg Post 4963, Veterans
16 of Foreign Wars, and organized annual Veterans Day memorial
17 services as well as memorial services for the anniversary of
18 the bombing of Pearl Harbor and to honor the memory of fellow
19 Cambria County native Marine Sergeant Michael Strank, who
20 helped to raise the United States flag at Iwo Jima.

21 (6) A caring member of his community, Mr. Vizzini
22 organized memorial services to honor the 63 miners who died
23 in the 1940 Sonman Mines explosion in Portage and was
24 influential in honoring the 112 individuals who lost their
25 lives in the Cambria Steel Company's 1902 Rolling Mine Mill
26 explosion in Johnstown.

27 (7) Mr. Vizzini was well-known throughout his community,
28 most notably for his passionate advocacy for his fellow
29 veterans and for the residents of Cambria Township, including
30 his efforts to keep the Ebensburg Center open, his work with

1 Ebensburg's annual Christmas celebrations, particularly the
2 life-size nativity scene, his organization of the Northern
3 Cambria County Immigrants Day in Nanty Glo and his efforts to
4 clean Sandyvale Cemetery.

5 (8) Charles J. Vizzini passed away on August 11, 2009,
6 at the age of 85.

7 (9) A decorated military veteran, Mr. Vizzini's awards
8 include two Purple Hearts and one Bronze Star.

9 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key 8344,
10 carrying U.S. Route 22 over Pennsylvania Route 160, also known
11 as New Germany Road, in Cambria Township, Cambria County, is
12 designated the Charles J. Vizzini Memorial Bridge.

13 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
14 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
15 traffic in both directions on the bridge and both directions on
16 the crossing route.

17 Section 7. Private Mahlon R. Evans Memorial Bridge.

18 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
19 follows:

20 (1) Mahlon R. Evans was born in Ebensburg, Cambria
21 County, on May 4, 1922.

22 (2) Private Evans graduated from Cambria High School in
23 1940 and graduated from Geneva College in 1947.

24 (3) Private Evans served in World War II in the 9th
25 Infantry Division.

26 (4) Private Evans was wounded in the Battle of Saint-Lô
27 in July 1944 and received the Purple Heart and Bronze Star
28 for his valiant service.

29 (5) Private Evans was an active member of College Hill
30 Presbyterian Church for more than 60 years where he served as

1 an elder and trustee, as well as the music director for more
2 than 20 years.

3 (6) Private Evans retired from Standard Steel Specialty
4 after 38 years of service in 1985.

5 (7) Private Evans passed away on July 14, 2012, at 90
6 years of age in the care of Sherwood Nursing Center.

7 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key 3795,
8 carrying Pennsylvania Route 251 over Interstate 376 in Chippewa
9 Township, Beaver County, is designated the Private Mahlon R.
10 Evans Memorial Bridge.

11 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
12 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
13 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

14 Section 8. Sgt. Skip Haswell Memorial Bridge.

15 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
16 follows:

17 (1) Lloyd "Skip" E. Haswell, Jr., was born October 18,
18 1944, in Ellwood City.

19 (2) Sgt. Haswell graduated from Lincoln High School in
20 1964 and from the Community College of Beaver County with an
21 associate's degree in Criminology.

22 (3) Sgt. Haswell entered the United States Marine Corps,
23 training at Parris Island, Camp Pendleton and Okinawa Jungle
24 Warfare Training Center.

25 (4) Sgt. Haswell served in Vietnam as a Sergeant in
26 Alpha Company, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines operating out of
27 Chu Lai Airbase from 1966 to 1967.

28 (5) Upon returning home from military service, Sgt.
29 Haswell joined the Beaver Falls Police Department.

30 (6) Sgt. Haswell was named Policeman of the Year in 1970

1 and founded the first K-9 unit in Beaver County.

2 (7) Sgt. Haswell was elected Chief of Police in 1984 and
3 retired in 1989.

4 (8) Sgt. Haswell trained with the United States Secret
5 Service and the Federal Bureau of Investigation while a
6 police captain.

7 (9) Upon retirement, Sgt. Haswell worked as Director of
8 Marketing at the Medic Rescue Ambulance Service, Emergency
9 Defensive Driver's Trainer and as Deputy Coroner with the
10 Beaver County Coroner's Office.

11 (10) Sgt. Haswell passed away on March 4, 2024, at 79
12 years of age in Nokomis, Florida.

13 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
14 57032, carrying Pennsylvania Route 351 over the Beaver River
15 between Koppel Borough and North Sewickley Township, Beaver
16 County, is designated the Sgt. Skip Haswell Memorial Bridge.

17 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
18 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
19 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

20 Section 9. Colonel Joseph H. Thompson Memorial Bridge.

21 (a) Finding.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
22 follows:

23 (1) Joseph H. Thompson was born September 26, 1871, in
24 Kilkeel, County Down, Ireland.

25 (2) Colonel Thompson graduated from Geneva College in
26 1904 and earned a second bachelor's degree from the
27 University of Pittsburgh in 1905 and then a law degree from
28 the University of Pittsburgh School of Law in 1909.

29 (3) Colonel Thompson was the University of Pittsburgh
30 football coach from 1908 to 1912 and helped facilitate the

1 implementation of the first known use of numbers on uniforms.

2 (4) In 1905, Colonel Thompson enlisted in the
3 Pennsylvania National Guard and during this time, he served
4 as a Pennsylvania State Senator from 1913 to 1916 for Beaver
5 and Lawrence Counties.

6 (5) In 1918, Colonel Thompson was promoted to the rank
7 of Colonel and served in World War I, where he was wounded
8 four times and gassed once.

9 (6) For his bravery, Colonel Thompson was awarded the
10 Distinguished Service Cross on October 1, 1918, however, this
11 award was updated to the Medal of Honor on October 5, 1925.

12 (7) The four wounds that Colonel Thompson received
13 entitled him to wear four wound chevrons, which was the
14 precursor to the Purple Heart, reestablished by the United
15 States President in 1932.

16 (8) Colonel Thompson survived the war and died at 57
17 years of age on February 1, 1928, in Beaver Falls, Beaver
18 County, from ailments aggravated by his war wounds.

19 (b) Designation.--The bridge carrying the Pennsylvania
20 Turnpike Mainline Eastbound over the Beaver River at mile marker
21 13.2 in Beaver County is designated as the Colonel Joseph H.
22 Thompson Memorial Bridge.

23 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
24 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
25 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

26 Section 10. Colonel Matthew S. Quay Memorial Bridge.

27 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
28 follows:

29 (1) Matthew Stanley Quay was born September 30, 1833, in
30 Dillsburg, York County.

1 (2) He attended the Beaver and Indiana Academies and
2 graduated in 1850 from Jefferson College, now Washington and
3 Jefferson College.

4 (3) Colonel Quay became Colonel of the 134th
5 Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry Regiment during the Civil War
6 from 1861 to 1862.

7 (4) For his bravery, Colonel Quay was awarded the Medal
8 of Honor at the Battle of Fredericksburg, Virginia, in
9 December 1862.

10 (5) During his life, Colonel Quay was a dedicated public
11 servant, serving as the Prothonotary of Beaver County in
12 1865, the personal secretary to Governor Andrew Curtin in
13 1861, a member of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives
14 from 1865 to 1868, the Secretary of the Commonwealth, the
15 Philadelphia County Recorder and Pennsylvania State Treasurer
16 in 1885 and was elected to the United States Senate from 1887
17 through 1899 and 1901 through 1904, representing
18 Pennsylvania.

19 (6) Colonel Quay died on May 28, 1904, in Beaver County.

20 (b) Designation.--The bridge carrying the Pennsylvania
21 Turnpike Mainline Westbound over the Beaver River at mile marker
22 13.2 in Beaver County is designated as the Colonel Matthew S.
23 Quay Memorial Bridge.

24 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
25 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
26 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

27 Section 11. Sergeant Jackie Seltzer Memorial Bridge.

28 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
29 follows:

30 (1) Sergeant Jackie Seltzer was born August 26, 1946, in

1 West Reading and was a resident of Hamburg Borough, Berks
2 County.

3 (2) Sergeant Seltzer was drafted into the United States
4 Army and became a member of Company B, 1st Battalion, 18th
5 Infantry Regiment, 1st Infantry Division.

6 (3) On May 12, 1968, Sergeant Seltzer was the squad
7 leader of a reconnaissance force which was pinned down in a
8 swamp in Phu Loi after encountering a hidden bunker and a
9 large group of Viet Cong. After locating the bunker, Sergeant
10 Seltzer charged and destroyed the bunker with grenades,
11 killing several enemy soldiers.

12 (4) After destroying the bunker, 21-year-old Sergeant
13 Seltzer was returning to evacuate the wounded when he was
14 struck by small arms fire and killed.

15 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
16 68136, carrying State Route 4028 over Mill Creek in Hamburg
17 Borough, Berks County, is designated the Sergeant Jackie Seltzer
18 Memorial Bridge.

19 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
20 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
21 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

22 Section 12. Lance Corporal John F. Muffler Memorial Bridge.

23 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
24 follows:

25 (1) John Frederick Muffler was born December 13, 1963,
26 in Elkins Park, Montgomery County.

27 (2) Lance Corporal Muffler graduated from Neshaminy High
28 School in 1981 and was a dedicated drummer in the Neshaminy
29 Marching Band.

30 (3) He served in the United States Marine Corps as a

1 Lance Corporal.

2 (4) Lance Corporal Muffler was killed in the terrorist
3 bombing of the United States Marine barracks.

4 (5) In the early morning hours of October 23, 1983, a
5 truck loaded with explosives crashed through the security
6 perimeter of the United States Marine Corps barracks in
7 Beirut, Lebanon.

8 (6) In the explosion that followed, 241 United States
9 military personnel were killed and 80 seriously wounded.

10 (7) Lance Corporal Muffler's mother supported the memory
11 of his service and sacrifice to our country by promoting the
12 establishment of the Beirut Memorial in Philadelphia.

13 (8) An annual award, inspired by John F. Muffler, is
14 presented to a drummer in the Neshaminy Band.

15 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key 7027,
16 in Middletown Township, Bucks County, is designated as the Lance
17 Corporal John F. Muffler Memorial Bridge.

18 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
19 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
20 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

21 Section 13. Ensign Sarah Mitchell Memorial Bridge.

22 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
23 follows:

24 (1) Sarah Joy Mitchell was born in Meadowbrook to John
25 and Betsy McClay Mitchell.

26 (2) A lifelong resident of Oakford, Ensign Mitchell was
27 a 2013 graduate of Neshaminy High School, where she
28 participated in field hockey, basketball and track and field.

29 (3) Ensign Mitchell furthered her education at the
30 Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, where

1 she served as a member of the Naval Reserve Officers Training
2 Corps of Cadets and earned a degree in 2017.

3 (4) Ensign Mitchell was a member of Saint Stephen's
4 Lutheran Church in Feasterville.

5 (5) Ensign Mitchell served in the United States Navy
6 with honor, pride, loyalty and distinction.

7 (6) Ensign Mitchell made the greatest of all sacrifices
8 in defense of the cause of freedom, passing away in the line
9 of duty at 23 years of age on July 8, 2018.

10 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
11 52786, carrying Pennsylvania Route 213 over the Neshaminy Creek
12 in Lower Southampton Township, Bucks County, is designated the
13 Ensign Sarah Mitchell Memorial Bridge.

14 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
15 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
16 traffic in both directions on the bridge.
17 Section 14. Staff Sergeant Peter P. Abromovich Memorial Bridge.

18 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
19 follows:

20 (1) Peter P. Abromovich was born November 19, 1917, in
21 Arcadia, Indiana County.

22 (2) He enlisted during World War II, served in the
23 United States Army Air Force until 1945 and rose to the rank
24 of Staff Sergeant.

25 (3) During his time in the military, Staff Sgt.
26 Abromovich flew more than 50 bombing missions over Europe and
27 the Pacific serving as the tail gunner and nose gunner on a
28 B24 Liberator.

29 (4) Staff Sgt. Abromovich's missions included flying
30 over Papua, New Guinea, the Solomon Islands, Central Europe

1 and Southern France.

2 (5) For his valiant service, Staff Sgt. Abromovich was
3 awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Distinguished
4 Unit Badge, the American Campaign Medal, the Asiatic Pacific
5 Campaign Medal and the Air Medal with four bronze oak leaf
6 clusters.

7 (6) After his commendable service, Staff Sgt. Abromovich
8 lived in Barnesboro, Cambria County, where he married and had
9 seven children and five grandchildren.

10 (7) Staff Sgt. Abromovich passed away July 25, 1997, at
11 79 years of age, surrounded by family and friends.

12 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
13 47666, carrying U.S. Route 219 over the West Branch Susquehanna
14 River in Susquehanna Township, Cambria County, is designated the
15 Staff Sergeant Peter P. Abromovich Memorial Bridge.

16 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
17 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
18 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

19 Section 15. Corporal James R. Beck USMC Memorial Bridge.

20 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
21 follows:

22 (1) James Robert Beck was born March 22, 1948, in
23 Cresson, Cambria County.

24 (2) Cpl. James R. Beck served in the Vietnam War with
25 the D Company, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines, 1st Marine
26 Division.

27 (3) On October 23, 1968, Corporal James R. Beck bravely
28 gave his life for his country. He was killed in an explosion
29 in the Quang Nam Province of South Vietnam.

30 (4) Cpl. James R. Beck is honored on the Vietnam

1 Veterans Memorial in Washington, DC. His name is inscribed on
2 Panel 40W, Line 23.

3 (5) For his bravery and gallantry in action, Corporal
4 James R. Beck was awarded the Combat Action Ribbon,
5 Marksmanship Badge, National Defense Service Medal, Vietnam
6 Service Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal, Marine Corps
7 Presidential Unit Citation, Vietnam Gallantry Cross, Marine
8 Corps Expeditionary Medal, Marine Corps Good Conduct Medal
9 and the Purple Heart.

10 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
11 48914, carrying Gallitzin Road, State Route 53, over Norfolk
12 Southern Railroad, located in Gallitzin Township, Cambria
13 County, is designated as the Corporal James R. Beck USMC
14 Memorial Bridge.

15 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
16 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
17 traffic in both directions on the bridge.
18 Section 16. Private Philip A. Watt Memorial Bridge.

19 (a) Finding.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
20 follows:

21 (1) Philip A. Watt was born May 21, 1921, in Ashville.

22 (2) Philip enlisted in the United States Army on June
23 11, 1942, in Pittsburgh.

24 (3) Private Watts left the United States for foreign
25 service on January 14, 1943, and was a member of Headquarters
26 Company, 1st Battalion, 13th Armored Regiment, 1st Armored
27 Division.

28 (4) On May 23, 1944, the 13th Armored Regiment was sent
29 to Anzio, Italy, to participate in the Battle of Anzio.

30 (5) On May 30, 1944, Private Watt was killed in action

1 around Anzio and was awarded the Purple Heart for his service
2 along with the Army Presidential Unit Citation and the Army
3 Good Conduct Medal posthumously.

4 (6) Private Watt is buried in the Sicily-Rome American
5 Cemetery in Nettuno, Italy.

6 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
7 52761, carrying Pennsylvania Route 53 over Clearfield Creek in
8 Gallitzin Township, Cambria County, is designated the Private
9 Philip A. Watt Memorial Bridge.

10 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
11 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
12 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

13 Section 17. PFC Paul O. Malzi and PFC Harry R. Malzi Memorial
14 Bridge.

15 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
16 follows:

17 (1) Paul O. Malzi and Harry R. Malzi were born in
18 Johnstown on December 24, 1916, and March 29, 1918,
19 respectively.

20 (2) Both the Malzi brothers enlisted in the United
21 States Army during World War II.

22 (3) Private First Class Paul Malzi was a member of
23 Company E, 318th Infantry Regiment, 80th Infantry Division
24 serving from March 17, 1944, to November 8, 1944.

25 (4) On November 8, 1944, Private First Class Paul Malzi
26 was killed in action while involved in offensive operations
27 in Rouves, France, and was awarded the World War II Victory
28 Medal, the World War II Service Lapel Button, the European-
29 African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal with one Bronze Service
30 Star and the Purple Heart.

1 (5) Private First Class Paul Malzi is buried in Plot C
2 Row 11 Grave 28, at the Lorraine American Cemetery, St.
3 Avold, France.

4 (6) Private First Class Harry Malzi was a member of an
5 Anti-Tank Company, 329th Infantry Regiment, 83rd Infantry
6 Division serving from February 15, 1943, to November 27,
7 1945.

8 (7) Private First Class Harry Malzi was killed in a
9 vehicle accident while on occupation duty in Lambach,
10 Austria, and was awarded the World War II Victory Medal, the
11 World War II Service Lapel Button and the European-African-
12 Middle Eastern Campaign Medal.

13 (8) Private First Class Harry Malzi is buried in
14 Richland Cemetery in Johnstown.

15 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key 8645,
16 carrying Galleria Drive (State Route 3031) over U.S. Route 219
17 in Richland Township, Cambria County, is designated the PFC Paul
18 O. Malzi and PFC Harry R. Malzi Memorial Bridge.

19 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
20 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
21 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

22 Section 18. Osceola Mills World War II Memorial Bridge.

23 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
24 follows:

25 (1) This Commonwealth and the nation are indebted to the
26 veterans of Osceola Mills, Clearfield County, for their
27 bravery, heroism and sacrifice during their service in World
28 War II.

29 (2) Thirty-five Osceola Mills residents lost their lives
30 in World War II, the highest percentage of any community in

1 the United States.

2 (3) It is fitting to recognize and honor the men and
3 woman from this region who bravely served their country
4 during World War II.

5 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key 9755,
6 carrying State Route 3027 over the Moshannon Creek in Rush
7 Township, Centre County, is designated as the Osceola Mills
8 World War II Memorial Bridge.

9 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
10 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
11 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

12 Section 19. Trooper First Class Brad Wilson Honorary Bridge.

13 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
14 follows:

15 (1) Prior to serving in the Pennsylvania State Police,
16 Trooper First Class Brad Wilson served in the United States
17 Air Force.

18 (2) Trooper First Class Wilson was stationed at the
19 DuBois barracks.

20 (3) On September 26, 2013, at approximately 2:30 p.m.,
21 Trooper First Class Wilson was shot and critically wounded
22 while trying to serve a warrant at a private residence in
23 Jefferson County.

24 (4) Following the shooting, Trooper First Class Wilson
25 was presented with the Pennsylvania State Police Purple Heart
26 Award in November 2014.

27 (5) In 2016, Trooper First Class Wilson was honorably
28 discharged from the Pennsylvania State Police after 25 years
29 of service to this Commonwealth.

30 (6) In 2016, Trooper First Class Wilson was presented

1 the "Officer of the Year" award from the American Legion,
2 Department of Pennsylvania, at the DuBois American Legion
3 Post 17.

4 (7) Trooper First Class Wilson continues to recover from
5 his injury in the line of duty today.

6 (8) Trooper First Class Wilson's honor was proposed by
7 the Military Order of the Purple Heart and Troop C of the
8 Pennsylvania State Police.

9 (9) The Clearfield County Commissioners, the Sandy
10 Township Supervisors and the DuBois City Council have all
11 taken official action in support of this designation.

12 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
13 42031, located on that portion of U.S. Route 219 over Pentz Run
14 on the border of Sandy Township and the City of DuBois,
15 Clearfield County, is designated as the Trooper First Class Brad
16 Wilson Honorary Bridge.

17 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
18 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
19 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

20 Section 20. Sarah "Marie" Blose Rorabaugh Memorial Bridge.

21 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
22 follows:

23 (1) Sarah "Marie" Blose Rorabaugh was born December 6,
24 1919, in Montgomery Township, Indiana County.

25 (2) She graduated from Montgomery Township "Arcadia"
26 High School in 1935 at 16 years of age.

27 (3) She went on to pursue a teaching degree from Indiana
28 State Teachers College, now known as Indiana University of
29 Pennsylvania, and graduated in 1938.

30 (4) Ms. Rorabaugh joined the Women Accepted for

1 Volunteer Emergency Service, known as WAVES, on August 24,
2 1944, and served during World War II as a Mailman 3rd Class.

3 (5) She was honorably discharged and was awarded the
4 Ribbon of Victory Medal for her service.

5 (6) Ms. Rorabaugh passed away at her home on May 31,
6 2010, in Burnside Township, Clearfield County.

7 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
8 11380, carrying U.S. Route 219 over the West Branch Susquehanna
9 River in Burnside Borough, Clearfield County, is designated the
10 Sarah "Marie" Blose Rorabaugh Memorial Bridge.

11 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
12 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
13 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

14 Section 21. Sergeant John Harold Branic Memorial Bridge.

15 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
16 follows:

17 (1) John Harold Branic was born April 4, 1916, in
18 Madera, Clearfield County.

19 (2) Sergeant Branic enlisted in the United States Marine
20 Corps at the start of World War II after graduating high
21 school and was a member of L Company, 3rd Battalion, 5th
22 Marines.

23 (3) On August 18, 1942, the Marines from L Company, 3rd
24 Battalion, 5th Marines began a combat patrol on Guadalcanal
25 that became known as Matanikau One.

26 (4) The Marines probed six miles westward to the
27 Matanikau River where, on August 19, 1942, the Japanese
28 spotted the Marines atop Hill 73 and directed mortars and
29 small arms fire against them.

30 (5) During this attack, Sergeant Branic was killed but

1 the Marines counterattacked and succeeded in driving the
2 Japanese back.

3 (6) The location of Sergeant Branich's remains were not
4 reported to headquarters as the L Company executive officer
5 was also killed during the action.

6 (7) On August 19, 1942, Sergeant Branich was officially
7 declared dead and earned the Purple Heart posthumously,
8 although his body was never recovered and he was officially
9 listed as missing in action.

10 (8) Sergeant Branich was memorialized at Manila American
11 Cemetery on the Tablets of the Missing.

12 (9) In 1992, work commenced at the Guadalcanal Memorial
13 on the Skyline Ridge atop Hill 73 and, during the excavation,
14 the remains of a marine were found with a ring with the
15 initials J.H.B. on the band.

16 (10) The remains were recovered and transported to
17 Hawaii where, in 2004, an American researcher with the First
18 Marine Division Association reported that a Solomon Islander
19 had possession of the ring with the inscription J.H.B.

20 (11) Joint POW/MIA Accounting Agency scientists and
21 Armed Forces DNA Identification specialists used
22 mitochondrial DNA to identify the remains of Sergeant Branich
23 and he was no longer considered missing in action.

24 (12) Sergeant Branich was the first Madera resident to be
25 killed during World War II.

26 (13) On August 9, 2006, Sergeant Branich was laid to rest
27 in Arlington National Cemetery.

28 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
29 11226, carrying Pennsylvania Route 53 over the Clearfield Creek
30 in Bigler Township, Clearfield County, is designated the

1 Sergeant John Harold Branich Memorial Bridge.

2 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
3 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
4 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

5 Section 22. Major General Harold "Harry" Greene Memorial
6 Bridge.

7 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
8 follows:

9 (1) Major General Harold "Harry" Greene was born
10 February 11, 1959, in Boston, Massachusetts.

11 (2) Major General Greene graduated from the United
12 States Army War College in Carlisle in 2002 with a Masters of
13 Strategic Studies degree.

14 (3) Major General Greene and his family called Carlisle
15 home for more than eight years from 2002 to 2010.

16 (4) In January 2014, Major General Greene was named
17 deputy commander of the Combined Security Transition Command
18 in Afghanistan.

19 (5) On August 5, 2014, Major General Greene was killed
20 in an attack while visiting Camp Qargha's Marshal Fahim
21 National Defense University in Kabul.

22 (6) Major General Greene is the highest-ranking American
23 officer to be killed on foreign soil since 1972.

24 (7) Major General Greene received the Army Distinguished
25 Service Medal, Legion of Merit and Purple Heart for his
26 service to our country.

27 (8) Major General Greene was laid to rest at Arlington
28 National Cemetery on August 14, 2014.

29 (9) Major General Greene is survived by his wife, Sue,
30 son, Matthew and daughter, Amelia.

1 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
2 13685, carrying Army Heritage Drive over Interstate 81 in
3 Middlesex Township, Cumberland County, is designated the Major
4 General Harold "Harry" Greene Memorial Bridge.

5 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
6 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
7 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

8 Section 23. Pvt. Clyde C. McVitty Memorial Bridge.

9 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
10 follows:

11 (1) Clyde C. McVitty was born January 29, 1923, in
12 Amberson.

13 (2) Pvt. McVitty attended grammar school in the
14 Chambersburg School District.

15 (3) Pvt. McVitty enlisted in the United States Army on
16 February 13, 1943, and was trained at Camp Wheeler and Fort
17 Benning, Georgia.

18 (4) Pvt. McVitty served with the 504th Parachute
19 Infantry Regiment, 82nd Airborne Division.

20 (5) Pvt. McVitty left for overseas duty in July 1943,
21 initially being stationed in Africa, and then later in Anzio,
22 Italy.

23 (6) Pvt. McVitty was killed in action February 9, 1944,
24 on the Anzio beach head in Italy.

25 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
26 56021, carrying Pennsylvania Route 997 over Conodoguinet Creek
27 in Letterkenny Township, Franklin County, is designated the Pvt.
28 Clyde C. McVitty Memorial Bridge.

29 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
30 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to

1 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

2 Section 24. H. Ronald Hoskinson Memorial Bridge.

3 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
4 follows:

5 (1) H. Ronald Hoskinson was born September 2, 1941, in
6 Mt. Morris and was a resident of Mt. Morris, Perry Township,
7 Greene County.

8 (2) Specialist Hoskinson was drafted into the United
9 States Army and became a member of Company B, 2nd Battalion,
10 2nd Infantry Regiment, 1st Infantry Division rising to the
11 rank of Specialist.

12 (3) On December 13, 1965, Specialist Hoskinson was
13 killed in action at 24 years of age.

14 (4) For his valiant service, Specialist Hoskinson was
15 awarded the Purple Heart and the National Defense, Vietnam
16 Service and Vietnam Campaign Medals.

17 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
18 18248, carrying State Route 2003 over Dunkard Creek in Mt.
19 Morris, Perry Township, Greene County, is designated the H.
20 Ronald Hoskinson Memorial Bridge.

21 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
22 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
23 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

24 Section 25. Private Samuel H. Thompson Memorial Bridge.

25 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
26 follows:

27 (1) Samuel H. Thompson was born in Coalmont Borough,
28 Huntingdon County, on August 22, 1913.

29 (2) Private Thompson enlisted in the United States Army
30 Air Forces during World War II.

1 (3) Private Thompson served in the Philippines during
2 World War II in the 20th Air Base Group attached to the 28th
3 Materiel Squadron.

4 (4) Private Thompson was captured during the Battle of
5 the Philippines after the fall of Corregidor Island to the
6 Japanese in early 1942.

7 (5) Private Thompson was sent to the Cabanatuan Prisoner
8 of War Camp in Central Luzon, Philippines, where he died of
9 illness and malnutrition on October 29, 1942, at 29 years of
10 age.

11 (6) Private Thompson is interred in Plot D, Row 3, Grave
12 209, at the Manila American Cemetery and Memorial in Manila,
13 Philippines.

14 (7) For his valiant service, Private Thompson was
15 awarded the Prisoner of War Medal, World War II Victory
16 Medal, American Campaign Medal, Army Presidential Unit
17 Citation, Army Good Conduct Medal and Asiatic-Pacific
18 Campaign Medal.

19 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
20 52783, carrying Pennsylvania Route 913 over Shoup Run in
21 Coalmont Borough, Huntingdon County, is designated the Private
22 Samuel H. Thompson Memorial Bridge.

23 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
24 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
25 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

26 Section 26. Staff Sergeant William Stivison Memorial Bridge.

27 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds as follows:

28 (1) Staff Sergeant William J. Stivison was born July 19,
29 1919, in Homer City, Indiana County.

30 (2) Staff Sergeant Stivison attended Homer City High

1 School and later the Bliss Electrician School.

2 (3) In 1935, Staff Sergeant Stivison joined the National
3 Guard and then, in 1941, he joined the United States Army
4 where he became a Staff Sergeant and Section Leader and a
5 member of the 2nd Ranger Infantry Battalion.

6 (4) On March 30, 1945, Staff Sergeant Stivison
7 encountered surprise enemy fire while moving into position in
8 Germany. Staff Sergeant Stivison led his platoon in an attack
9 so rapid and determined that the outer defenses of the enemy
10 were speedily overwhelmed.

11 (5) During this assault, Staff Sergeant Stivison
12 demolished a machine gun nest and killed nine enemy soldiers
13 and continued to attack toward the inner defenses. When his
14 platoon was pinned down by enemy machine gun fire from
15 commanding ground on both flanks, Staff Sergeant Stivison
16 completely ignored personal safety, twice exposing himself to
17 heavy enemy fire to carry wounded men to cover.

18 (6) When his platoon was ordered to withdraw, Staff
19 Sergeant Stivison remained to draw the fire of the enemy away
20 while his comrades withdrew.

21 (7) For his bravery, Staff Sergeant Stivison received
22 the Silver Star, Bronze Star and two Purple Hearts with two
23 Oak Clusters.

24 (8) After the war, Staff Sergeant Stivison spent his
25 lifetime volunteering with his local fire department,
26 fishing, hunting, camping and square dancing.

27 (9) On April 2, 2007, Staff Sergeant Stivison died in
28 his sleep at his home in Homer City, Indiana County.

29 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
30 68411, carrying Jacksonville Road (State Route 3016) over Two

1 Lick Creek in Homer City, Indiana County, is designated the
2 Staff Sergeant William Stivison Memorial Bridge.

3 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
4 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
5 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

6 Section 27. Major General Edward C. Shannon Memorial Bridge.

7 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
8 follows:

9 (1) Edward Casswell Shannon was born in Phoenixville,
10 Chester County, on June 24, 1870, and moved to Columbia
11 Borough as an adult.

12 (2) Major General Shannon began his military career as a
13 member of the 4th Infantry Division of the Pennsylvania
14 National Guard.

15 (3) Major General Shannon served in the Spanish American
16 War, Pancho Villa Expedition and World War I, after which he
17 was awarded a Silver Star and the Army Distinguished Service
18 Medal.

19 (4) Major General Shannon retired from the Pennsylvania
20 National Guard in 1939 at the rank of Major General and
21 commander of the 28th Infantry Division.

22 (5) Major General Shannon served Lancaster County as an
23 elected Prothonotary in 1919 and served as Lieutenant
24 Governor under Gifford Pinchot from 1930 to 1935.

25 (6) During World War II, Major General Shannon served as
26 the chairman of the local draft board.

27 (7) Major General Shannon passed away on May 20, 1946,
28 in Columbia and was laid to rest in the Laurel Hill Memorial
29 Gardens in Columbia.

30 (8) In 2016, Major General Shannon was posthumously

1 inducted into the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs
2 Hall of Fame in Fort Indiantown Gap.

3 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
4 52686, carrying Pennsylvania Route 441 over U.S. Route 30 in
5 Columbia Borough, Lancaster County, is designated the Major
6 General Edward C. Shannon Memorial Bridge.

7 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
8 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
9 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

10 Section 28. Staff Sergeant William Will Memorial Bridge.

11 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
12 follows:

13 (1) Staff Sergeant William Anthony Will was born August
14 4, 1941, in Dravosburg Borough, Allegheny County.

15 (2) In 1959, Staff Sergeant Will enlisted in the United
16 States Army where he became a decorated member of the Green
17 Beret Special Forces unit.

18 (3) Staff Sergeant Will served tours of duty in Laos and
19 South Vietnam where in 1964 he and two other American
20 soldiers were captured by the Viet Cong. After returning
21 safely to his own troops, Staff Sergeant Will was awarded the
22 Army Commendation Medal on January 8, 1965, at Fort Bragg,
23 North Carolina.

24 (4) On July 5, 1966, 24-year-old Staff Sergeant Will was
25 on a combat mission against enemy forces when he was killed
26 by small arms fire.

27 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
28 67935, carrying State Route 1015 over the Raystown Branch of the
29 Juniata River in Allegheny Township, Somerset County, is
30 designated as the Staff Sergeant William Will Memorial Bridge.

1 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
2 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
3 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

4 Section 29. Seaman First Class Raymond Kozik Memorial Bridge.

5 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
6 follows:

7 (1) Raymond Kozik was born in 1925 in Cairnbrook,
8 Somerset County.

9 (2) Seaman First Class Kozik served in the United States
10 Navy on the USS Indianapolis, stationed in waters off the
11 coast of Guam in the Philippine Sea.

12 (3) On July 30, 1945, the USS Indianapolis was torpedoed
13 and sunk by the Japanese Navy.

14 (4) Of the 1195 crew members aboard the USS
15 Indianapolis, 300 were killed instantly but Seaman First
16 Class Kozik survived the initial blast, floating with only a
17 Kapok life vest in a group of 175 survivors.

18 (5) Seaman First Class Kozik died on the fourth day
19 after the attack, one day before rescue efforts saved the
20 remaining 63 seamen.

21 (6) To date, the attack on the USS Indianapolis is the
22 worst naval disaster at sea in United States history.

23 (7) Seaman First Class Kozik is memorialized on the Wall
24 of the Missing in the Manila American Cemetery in Manila,
25 Philippines.

26 (8) For his valiant service, Seaman First Class Kozik
27 was posthumously awarded the Navy Expeditionary Medal, Combat
28 Action Ribbon, World War II Victory Medal, American Campaign
29 Medal, Navy Presidential Unit Citation, Navy Good Conduct
30 Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal and the Purple Heart.

1 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
2 31544, carrying State Route 1016 over the Dark Shade Creek in
3 Shade Township, Somerset County, is designated the Seaman First
4 Class Raymond Kozik Memorial Bridge.

5 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
6 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
7 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

8 Section 30. Kenneth J. Newcomer Memorial Bridge.

9 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
10 follows:

11 (1) Kenneth J. Newcomer was born in 1921 in Jerome,
12 Somerset County, to John and Edna Newcomer.

13 (2) Mr. Newcomer was one of nine children and one of
14 four brothers that served in World War II.

15 (3) Mr. Newcomer enlisted in the United States Military
16 in January 1944.

17 (4) Mr. Newcomer was assigned to the Second Engineer
18 Combat Battalion, Company C in the European Theatre.

19 (5) Mr. Newcomer was trained as a combat engineer and
20 rose to the rank of Technician Grade 5.

21 (6) Mr. Newcomer landed in mainland Europe on D-Day and
22 received the Silver Star for bravery under fire during the
23 battle for Hill 192 during June 1944.

24 (7) Mr. Newcomer was killed in action on October 9,
25 1944, in Belgium.

26 (8) In addition to his military service, Mr. Newcomer
27 served in the Civilian Conservation Corps as a teenager.

28 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
29 31426, carrying East Campus Avenue over U.S. Route 219 in
30 Conemaugh Township, Somerset County, is designated the Kenneth

1 J. Newcomer Memorial Bridge.

2 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
3 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
4 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

5 Section 31. S2 Earl J. Peters Memorial Bridge.

6 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
7 follows:

8 (1) Earl J. Peters was born August 2, 1910, in
9 Markleton, Somerset County.

10 (2) Mr. Peters was an S2 in the United States Navy,
11 serving on the U.S.S. Indianapolis from January 25, 1944, to
12 July 30, 1945.

13 (3) The U.S.S. Indianapolis's last mission was to carry
14 parts of the first atomic bomb used in combat to a United
15 States airbase on Tinian.

16 (4) On July 30, 1945, the U.S.S. Indianapolis fell
17 victim to a Japanese submarine.

18 (5) Within 12 minutes, 330 members of the ship's crew
19 were lost with the ship and the rest, some 860 men, were left
20 in the Pacific Ocean in the middle of the night.

21 (6) Mr. Peters was among the casualties in the attack.

22 (7) For the next five days, without food or water, the
23 remaining crew battled the elements, dodged shark attacks and
24 clung to life as best as they could.

25 (8) The sinking of the U.S.S. Indianapolis was the
26 greatest single loss of life at sea in the history of the
27 United States Navy, as out of the 1,195 sailors and marines
28 on board, only 316 survived.

29 (9) Mr. Peters received the Purple Heart, Silver Star
30 and Silver Cross for his sacrifice.

1 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
2 31696, carrying State Route 3011 over the Casselman River in
3 Black Township, Somerset County, is designated the S2 Earl J.
4 Peters Memorial Bridge.

5 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
6 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
7 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

8 Section 32. Staff Sergeant Alvin P. Carey and Private John C.
9 Ewing Medal of Honor Memorial Bridge.

10 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
11 follows:

12 (1) Alvin P. Carey was born August 16, 1916, in
13 Lycippus, Westmoreland County.

14 (2) Mr. Carey graduated from Ligonier High School in
15 1935.

16 (3) Mr. Carey enlisted in the United States Army in
17 January 1941, shortly after the attack on Pearl Harbor.

18 (4) Staff Sergeant Carey landed at Utah Beach in
19 Normandy on June 7, 1944, with the 2nd Infantry Division.
20 Initially wounded in action and awarded the Purple Heart, he
21 returned to the front lines to fight the Germans in Brest,
22 France. While at Brest, Staff Sergeant Carey was mortally
23 wounded after crawling up a fire-riddled hill alone to take
24 on a German pillbox. Due to his brave actions, the Allied
25 soldiers were able to quickly take over the pillbox, leading
26 to the end of Axis control in France.

27 (5) John C. Ewing was born March 4, 1843, in Donegal
28 Township, Westmoreland County.

29 (6) Mr. Ewing received no formal education and was self-
30 taught.

1 (7) Mr. Ewing volunteered for service with the
2 Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry 211th on September 12, 1864.

3 (8) Private Ewing and his regiment took part in the
4 final assaults on Confederate positions in Petersburg,
5 Virginia. On April 2, 1865, he engaged in hostile hand-to-
6 hand combat, during which he captured the flags at the Battle
7 of Five Forks near Petersburg. The battle was a key turning
8 point, as it caused the fall of Richmond and led to the
9 surrender of the Northern Virginia Army.

10 (9) For their bravery, both men were awarded the
11 Congressional Medal of Honor. Both men are considered
12 hometown heroes to many in the Westmoreland County community.

13 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
14 36247, carrying Pennsylvania Route 711 over Loyalhanna Creek in
15 Ligonier Township, Westmoreland County, is designated as the
16 Staff Sergeant Alvin P. Carey and Private John C. Ewing Medal of
17 Honor Memorial Bridge.

18 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
19 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
20 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

21 Section 33. Private Edward J. Stambaugh Memorial Bridge.

22 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
23 follows:

24 (1) Edward John Stambaugh was born February 24, 1923, in
25 York.

26 (2) Private Stambaugh was a member of the Holtzschwamm
27 Lutheran Church in Thomasville and participated in Sunday
28 school and the church orchestra.

29 (3) Private Stambaugh enlisted in the United States Army
30 on September 8, 1942, and completed basic training at Fort

1 McClellan in Alabama and Fort Riley in Kansas.

2 (4) After completing basic training, Private Stambaugh
3 was assigned to M Company, 116th Infantry Regiment, 29th
4 Infantry Division at Fort Meade, Maryland, and then deployed
5 overseas on December 5, 1943, and was stationed in Weymouth,
6 England.

7 (5) On June 5, 1944, Private Stambaugh was transported
8 on the USS Charles Carroll for the D-Day invasion and his
9 company was to land in the eighth wave of the Normandy
10 invasion, approximately 57 minutes after the first wave.

11 (6) On the morning of June 6, 1944, the six Higgins
12 boats of M Company landed on Omaha Beach, which was still
13 under heavy fire from previous waves on the beach.

14 (7) M Company landed some 1,400 yards to the east of
15 their assigned landing area at the beach section designated
16 East Red and in the 1st Infantry Division's area.

17 (8) All six boats reached the beach at approximately the
18 same time, with Private Stambaugh and the rest of M Company
19 quickly exiting the boats taking cover behind beach obstacles
20 at the edge of the surf.

21 (9) While exiting, Boat Team Six was now separated from
22 the rest of M Company and joined a small group of the 116th
23 Regiment and began operations against a nearby German
24 position, killing and capturing the German defenders,
25 allowing more troops to exit the beach and for engineers to
26 fill the anti-tank ditch and to mark minefields.

27 (10) On June 7, 1944, M Company drove west to clear the
28 remaining German resistance where they encountered heavy
29 artillery fire as they neared Vierville-sur-Mer, France.

30 (11) On the evening of June 12, 1944, after achieving

1 most of its objectives, M Company crossed the Elle River
2 under light resistance taking the towns of Saint-Clair-sur-
3 l'Elle and Couvains, France.

4 (12) On June 16, 1944, M Company moved towards Saint-Lô,
5 France, and their advance was met with heavy enemy fire,
6 resulting in casualties.

7 (13) It was on this day that Private Stambaugh was
8 killed by artillery fire, near the village of Couvains,
9 France.

10 (14) The morning report of M Company on June 16, 1944,
11 listed Private Stambaugh as killed in action.

12 (15) For his bravery, Private Stambaugh was posthumously
13 awarded a Purple Heart medal and was buried on June 23, 1944,
14 at the La Cambe Cemetery located approximately 6.5 miles west
15 of Omaha Beach and approximately 13 miles north of where
16 Private Stambaugh was killed.

17 (16) On January 20, 1948, Private Stambaugh's remains,
18 at the request of family, were returned to the United States,
19 and on February 19, 1948, his remains were buried at the
20 Paradise Holtzschwamm Lutheran Church Cemetery in
21 Thomasville.

22 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key
23 54167, carrying U.S. Route 30 over Paradise Creek between
24 Paradise Township and Jackson Township, York County, is
25 designated the Private Edward J. Stambaugh Memorial Bridge.

26 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
27 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
28 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

29 Section 34. Special Agent Terry R. Anderson Memorial Highway.

30 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as

1 follows:

2 (1) Terry Ray Anderson was born in Washington, Iowa, on
3 January 19, 1924.

4 (2) Special Agent Anderson attended college at Drake
5 University and the University of Notre Dame.

6 (3) Special Agent Anderson enlisted in the Marine Corps
7 his sophomore year of college during World War II.

8 (4) Special Agent Anderson served in the Marine Corps
9 for two years and was discharged as a lieutenant.

10 (5) Special Agent Anderson returned to Iowa in 1947 and
11 taught history at Dallas Center High School, where he also
12 coached football, basketball and track.

13 (6) Special Agent Anderson joined the Federal Bureau of
14 Investigation (FBI) in 1951.

15 (7) After joining the FBI, Special Agent Anderson spent
16 his first year in the FBI's Cincinnati and Dayton, Ohio,
17 offices, and he was later assigned to the Philadelphia
18 Division in January 1952 and served in the main office for
19 four years before being assigned as a resident agent in
20 Harrisburg.

21 (8) Special Agent Anderson lived in Cumberland County
22 with his wife and four children, where he was active in local
23 youth sports programs, supporting his children.

24 (9) On May 17, 1966, Special Agent Anderson was shot and
25 killed in the line of duty while pursuing a kidnapped victim
26 and her abductor in the rugged mountain terrain near Shade
27 Gap, Huntingdon County.

28 (10) The kidnapped victim was later rescued and the
29 abductor was killed on May 18, 1966.

30 (11) Special Agent Anderson was laid to rest at the Elm

1 Grove Cemetery in his hometown of Washington, Iowa.

2 (b) Designation.--The portion of U.S. Route 522 from the
3 intersection with Main Street to the intersection with Town Hill
4 Street in Shade Gap Borough, Huntingdon County, is designated
5 the Special Agent Terry R. Anderson Memorial Highway.

6 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
7 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to
8 traffic in both directions on the highway.

9 Section 35. Robindale Memorial Highway.

10 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
11 follows:

12 (1) The town of Robindale stands as a testament to the
13 indomitable spirit and resilience of its residents, having
14 overcome numerous challenges throughout its storied history.

15 (2) The heart of this community was deeply impacted by
16 two tragic mining accidents that claimed the lives of 11
17 dedicated coal miners who toiled tirelessly to support their
18 town.

19 (3) In addition to this profound loss, Robindale has
20 valiantly endured three severe floods that tested the mettle
21 of its residents, demonstrating their unwavering commitment
22 to preserving their beloved community.

23 (4) It is fitting and just to recognize the sacrifices
24 of these 11 brave miners and the resiliency of the entire
25 Robindale community.

26 (b) Designation.--The portion of State Route 2008 from the
27 intersection with State Route 2009 to the intersection with
28 Pennsylvania Route 56 in West Wheatfield Township and East
29 Wheatfield Township, Indiana County, is designated as the
30 Robindale Memorial Highway.

1 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
2 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the designated
3 highway to traffic in both directions on the highway.

4 Section 36. William F. Quinn Memorial Interchange.

5 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds that:

6 (1) William F. Quinn was born April 7, 1922, in Pocono
7 Lake where he lived all his life.

8 (2) Mr. Quinn served in the United States Navy Armed
9 Guard during World War II.

10 (3) After the war, Mr. Quinn was a dedicated public
11 servant serving as Tobyhanna Township supervisor from 1950 to
12 1959; assistant superintendent, then superintendent of the
13 Department of Transportation of the Commonwealth, in Monroe
14 County from 1966 to 1971; and a Monroe County Commission from
15 1972 to 1976.

16 (4) Mr. Quinn received the Governor's Monthly Award for
17 Excellence in September 1969 and in January 1970 was
18 presented the award by former Governor Ray Schafer.

19 (5) Mr. Quinn also served on the steering committee for
20 Jack Kemp for President and was an alternate delegate for the
21 Republican Party in 1988 and 1992.

22 (6) A community leader his entire life, Mr. Quinn was a
23 life member and past commander of the Wilson-Fischer Post 413
24 American Legion, Pocono Pines, a 50 year member, life member
25 and past president of the Tobyhanna Township Volunteer Fire
26 Company, active with the Tobyhanna Volunteer Ambulance Corps,
27 served on the board of directors of The Salvation Army, East
28 Stroudsburg, board member of the Pocono Mountain Municipal
29 Airport Authority, member of the BPO Elks 319, East
30 Stroudsburg, and a life member and past president of the

1 Pocono Lions Club where he was elected Lion of the Year in
2 1987.

3 (7) In his free time, Mr. Quinn was an active sportsman,
4 being an avid fisherman and hunter.

5 (8) Mr. Quinn passed away on May 9, 2001, in Wilkes-
6 Barre.

7 (b) Designation.--The interchange of Interstate 380 with
8 Pennsylvania Route 940 in Tobyhanna Township, Monroe County, is
9 designated the William F. Quinn Memorial Interchange.

10 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
11 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the
12 interchange to traffic in both directions.

13 Section 37. Sergeant Charles Owen Jenkins, Jr., Memorial
14 Bridge.

15 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
16 follows:

17 (1) Sergeant Charles Owen Jenkins, Jr., was born January
18 14, 1941.

19 (2) Sergeant Jenkins was a resident of Clearfield County
20 and attended Reade Township High School.

21 (3) Sergeant Jenkins enlisted in the United States Army,
22 obtaining the rank of sergeant and serving during the Vietnam
23 War where he began his tour of duty on February 23, 1965.

24 (4) Sergeant Jenkins' military occupation or specialty
25 was Light Weapons Infantry, and he was attached to the
26 Special Forces, 5th Special Forces Group, A5 414.

27 (5) During his service in the Vietnam War, Sergeant
28 Jenkins was reported missing near Dong Xoai, Phuoc Long
29 Province, South Vietnam, and declared dead on June 10, 1965.

30 (6) For his bravery and sacrifice, Sergeant Jenkins was

1 awarded the Purple Heart, Bronze Star and South Vietnam
2 Gallantry Cross.

3 (b) Designation.--The bridge, identified as Bridge Key 8574,
4 carrying State Route 1021 over Clearfield Creek in White
5 Township, Cambria County, is designated the Sergeant Charles
6 Owen Jenkins, Jr., Memorial Bridge.

7 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
8 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
9 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

10 Section 38. Terry D. Tackett Jr. Memorial Bridge.

11 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
12 follows:

13 (1) Terry D. Tackett, Jr., was born September 29, 1990,
14 at Ohio Valley Hospital in McKees Rocks.

15 (2) Mr. Tackett served as a lieutenant volunteer fireman
16 at the Presto Fire Department.

17 (3) Mr. Tackett loved helping people any way he could
18 and enjoyed saving lives as a volunteer fireman.

19 (4) Mr. Tackett was known as a selfless, caring and
20 courageous individual who would sacrifice his own well-being
21 to come to the aid of others.

22 (5) Mr. Tackett loved AMA dirt bike racing, kayaking,
23 camping and spending time with his beloved family.

24 (6) Mr. Tackett passed away on October 19, 2022, in a
25 vehicular accident.

26 (b) Designation.--The bridge, carrying the Pennsylvania
27 Turnpike 576 Southern Beltway Eastbound and Westbound over
28 Pennsylvania Route 980 at mile marker S-12.35, is designated the
29 Terry D. Tackett Jr. Memorial Bridge.

30 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and

1 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
2 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

3 Section 39. Repeals.

4 Repeals are as follows:

5 (1) The General Assembly declares that the repeal under
6 paragraph (2) is necessary to effectuate the designation
7 under section 6.

8 (2) Section 21 of the act of November 3, 2022 (P.L.2028,
9 No.140), is repealed.

10 (3) The General Assembly declares that the repeal under
11 paragraph (4) is necessary to effectuate the designation
12 under section 32.

13 (4) Section 6 of the act of October 23, 2023 (P.L.81,
14 No.17), is repealed.

15 (5) The General Assembly declares that the repeal under
16 paragraph (6) is necessary to effectuate the designation
17 under section 37.

18 (6) Section 31 of the act of October 23, 2023 (P.L.81,
19 No.17), is repealed.

20 Section 40. Effective date.

21 This act shall take effect as follows:

22 (1) The following provisions shall take effect
23 immediately:

24 (i) This section.

25 (ii) Sections 37 and 39(5) and (6).

26 (2) Sections 9 and 10 shall take effect January 1, 2027.

27 (3) The remainder of this act shall take effect in 60
28 days.
